CYPRUS Pop. 1.2 Mil. UK 6 Logos English School of Education

We give thanks to the Lord for all His help through this time of COVID. As you can imagine, the disruptions to the school have been many and varied. Several members of staff have been taken ill with COVID, some quite seriously. One member of staff was hospitalised, but we are happy to report that currently all our staff are back to work.

Since 2020, all the schools in Cyprus, including the Logos School, are required to meet the regulatory standards of the European Union regarding school facilities. The Lord was most gracious to help us overcome quite a number of difficulties that had to be dealt with regarding the structure of the building, creating and updating a number of toilet facilities and re-organising the layout of classrooms. We then had to prepare and submit extensive documentation detailing the way the curriculum is taught, and the working policies adopted by the school. We have been verbally told we have met all the required standards and our licence to teach has been retained.

We will soon be presenting all these documents as the final part of our application for a building license, which will officially verify our buildings can continue to be used as a school by the Municipality of Limassol. We ask for the prayers of the Lord's people, as this license will allow the continuation of a work that was established nearly 50 years ago. We hope, once this approval is granted in the Lord's goodness, to be able to move forward with the on-hold project of building new classrooms to replace those that have become unusable due to the changes in legislation.

The Gospel message is heard every morning at school assembly and throughout the day as the teachers have opportunity to speak with the pupils and tell them of the way of salvation. Our greatest joy is the moment when a young person comes to us and simply says that they have trusted the Saviour.

We deeply value the interest shown toward us and the work here in Cancun. At the beginning of the year, we were encouraged to be able to distribute a good number of calendars to the homes surrounding the hall as well as other gospel contacts. The believers were also actively involved, distributing to their neighbours and family members.

In January, a young man named Reinaldo professed to be saved and has been faithfully attending the meetings. That has been uplifting to the assembly. We ask you to pray for him. We are also encouraged with several new contacts that have attended in these past two months.

We have been having the regular weekly meetings at the hall as well as streaming them online via Zoom, as there are still several that are not able to attend all of the meetings. At the hall here in Cancun, there is a main auditorium on one side and on the other side is where we have the kitchen, two bathrooms, the baptistry and an area for Sunday School. We had been noticing for some time that the floor in the area for the Bible classes had been slowly sinking in one certain spot. It was also affecting the walls and causing cracks. During the month of February, construction work was done on this section, changing the floor and fixing the walls. It was a surprise to us, as well as to the workers, that as they were ripping up the old floor, they discovered a large dry hole underneath the floor. It required four truckloads of rocks to fill it in! We are thankful to the Lord that this hole was discovered and that the floor was fixed, before any other damage was done. At the same time, they also did some minor construction to the roof on the same side of the hall.

We recently enjoyed a two-week visit from Amy's parents, David and Mabel Swan (Nova Scotia, Canada). David was a big help in each meeting, speaking by translation in both gospel and ministry. He spoke on practical and encouraging topics and the believers benefited from his ministry.

We ask you to pray for the unsaved spouses of several believers, for the salvation of souls here in this city, for the Sunday school and for the health of several believers that are currently going through health struggles.

Just prior to Christmas I used my trailer to hold an outdoor Christmas carol service in the Gospel Hall car park and we were really encouraged by the response – about 150 people came in total, with around half of them being folk from the community, many of whom hadn't been to the Hall before.

We're encouraged that numbers have kept up at our weekly "Good News at 1" outreach on Sundays, with 12-16 people attending each week, most of whom are not saved.

Numbers are still fairly small on Monday evenings at the soup

kitchen in town but have increased slightly on Wednesday nights nearer the Hall. I was in prison last week to visit someone who's being released soon. He came to our soup kitchen a couple of times and our football outreach once, years ago, and has made a profession of faith whilst inside – I'm hoping to meet up with him when he gets out.

We've recently distributed copies of our Signpost magazine in several different areas in Perth, resulting in a couple of ladies requesting Bibles. We also had a couple of new visitors to our "Good News at 1" as a result of the distribution.

We've had a couple of baptisms in the past fortnight. Darren is in his 30s and was saved reading his Bible at home several months ago. He saw our videos online and started coming along at the start of the year. Roger is in his 50s and has been saved quite a number of years – he is an ex-soldier and has very bad PTSD. It's been good to see him a lot more stable recently and a joy to see him being baptised. Please pray for both of these men.

Next week we plan to start a monthly community lunch in the Hall. We're hoping that it will bring us into contact with some new people and will give another opportunity to present the Gospel.

I don't tend to plan very far ahead but would appreciate your prayers in relation to the recommencement of our football outreach and youth café in the spring. Later in the summer I'm due to speak at the Tayside Senior Camp, and Graeme Paterson and I are planning a few days of outreach in St Andrews in early August.

BRAZIL Pop. 214 Mil. UK 20 Rio Grande Do Sul

We are so thankful to the Lord that after the dark days that we faced in the early part of last year, the pandemic situation has improved considerably. Although in recent weeks we had quite an explosion of Omicron cases like most other countries, we have seen very few people becoming really ill. Since the turn of the year case numbers far exceeded the worst days of last year, but intensive care occupancy and deaths remained relatively low. We are so thankful that we have been able to maintain full normal assembly activity for quite some time now, and even the Sunday school has not caused us any problems, in spite of more than 30 children being picked up on the bus.

It has been great to get back to the routine of visiting neighbouring assemblies to help with their midweek meetings and we have really enjoyed being back with the believers in Alvorada, Cachoeirinha, Osório etc, as well as Ivoti and Novo Hamburgo in our own area. A brother of 83 from the Ivoti assembly passed away recently (not Covid related). While we were thankful for a measure of liberty and excellent attention while speaking at his funeral, his passing has left the assembly in Ivoti very weak.

I recently paid an interesting visit to Candiota, in the south of the State, with 2 brethren from the Porto Alegre area. Quite a few interesting contacts were made in this town before the pandemic, but this was the first visit since things have started to improve. We travelled to Candiota on the Friday night and spent the Saturday visiting in the area before holding a meeting in a local community centre in the evening. We then travelled to São Gabriel so we could be with the assembly there for the Breaking of Bread on the Lord's Day. We then returned to Candiota to do some more visiting in the afternoon, before returning home in the early hours of Monday morning. In all we travelled

over 1000 miles, and although the Gospel meeting was smaller than we would have liked, we felt that we had some very profitable conversations with contacts.

These past two years of Government Covid Restrictions have been a frustrating time for outreach work from the assembly, but we have tried to maintain contact with people of all ages – by visits, letter-writing, and telephone calls. We are thankful that things are now opening up again, and we would value your prayers that we will see the Holy Spirit at work in the lives of many of the families we keep in contact with.

In February we restarted: the Community Coffee Morning which is well attended by mothers and toddlers; and the Men's and Ladies' Bible Studies (12 and 9 attended respectively). Please pray for God to work at these gatherings.

One of the greatest encouragements was when we restarted our Monday evening Children's Meeting this week. We had over 40 kids on the first night. I had a tear in my eye when they enthusiastically sang favourite choruses telling of the Saviour and His love. This was the first time we had heard children sing in our hall for around two years. One mother attended with her two young boys. Please pray for Julie. She and her husband Jason were both brought up in Christian homes but are still unbelievers. I have had frank conversations with them, and they have acknowledged their need of salvation. It was good to have her under the sound of the gospel message.

I continue visiting in the district and presently have the opportunity to share the gospel message with some who have never heard it before. Please pray for Sean and Anetta whose 20-year-old grandson recently committed suicide; and Sean and Margaret (Sean is presently in prison and I have been communicating with him – he rang me from the prison phone last week).

It was good recently to attend a 'STEP Weekend' of Bible teaching for young believers. Gareth and Margaret organise three of these weekends every year. Around 40 young believers attended, and a further 30 joined us on Zoom. Over the weekend we considered 'An Overview of the Prophecy of Isaiah'. These young lives are so full of potential for the Saviour: please pray that they will be fully yielded to Him.

Please pray for Gareth and Margaret. At present they are distributing prizes to over 4,000 Postal Bible School students. They are delivering prizes to the schools and giving the schools a video presentation as a means of sharing the gospel with the pupils and staff. They have also planned a number of public Prizegivings, the first of which is in Co Donegal this evening. Please pray that as they have the opportunity to share the gospel face to face with students and parents, it will find a response in their hearts.

The coffee shop has proved popular in Tenby. It is open from Tuesday to Saturday from 10am until 4pm. All soup, sandwiches, cakes, teas and coffees are provided free as an outreach, though there is a donations box for those who wish to contribute. We have had many unbelievers visit us and they have been complimentary about the premises, the texts and books on the wall, and the welcome they have received. Please pray that this will be a place where many will find peace. We have a Christian bookshop on the premises too, with new and second-hand titles, Bibles, greeting cards etc made available. There are so few such bookshops around these days, we hope it will meet a need.

We also run a food bank from the back of the chapel and that has made us many contacts in the town, both with those who need food from the food bank and those who donate. As a result of some of these contacts, we have had strangers in most Sundays to the gospel meeting. We also have a pool of 25 children in Sunday School, and all of them are accompanied by their parents. Some of these parents who attend are believers, though they are not in fellowship. Many are unbelievers. It is a wonderful opportunity to preach the word to adults and teach the word to children.

The sisters in fellowship are hoping to re-start the parent and toddlers group next Thursday morning and we also have plans for a youth night on Friday evenings.

We are eighteen in fellowship at the moment. We have much for which to thank the Lord.

VENEZUELA Pop. 28.5 Mil. UK 7 Tucupita

The Lord in his goodness and mercy to us has permitted some growth in the work here for which we are very grateful. Last November, eight believers were baptized bringing the little group up to 16. There are a few others who have also professed salvation and are continuing well. Most of the believers show a real interest to help in gospel outreach. We value your prayers for their preservation and that the Holy Spirit may prepare men with a good testimony and a shepherd's heart to care for the people of God in this locality.

We have been encouraged seeing the interest of several who have been attending the gospel meetings in the different areas where the message is preached. A young man called Lisandro who is an indigenous teacher in Janokosebe, a community where we go on Mondays, was asking several questions about salvation after the last meeting we had there. He is reading the New Testament, so we appreciate your prayers for him. In this community, there is one elderly brother who is baptized, Don Guillermo. One of his daughters also professes to be saved and has been showing an interest to obey the Lord and get her life put in order.

Yesterday we were able to return to a village called El Moriche, where we had a children's work before the pandemic began. Around 200 children and many adults gathered under some Mango trees to hear the word of God. We hope to be able to continue once a week with this gospel outreach. We have also begun 3 other bible classes for children which had been cancelled since before the pandemic started.

In spite of the difficulty to get gasoline, we were able to go in our little boat, last Tuesday to a few communities down the river. In 4 different places we shared a gospel message to a number of children and adults. The last place we visited is a community of around 70 houses called Santo Domingo. The people showed a real interest to listen, so we are praying that the Lord may do a work in their hearts, and we may also be able to return frequently to preach the gospel.

Your prayers are of great value to us. We realize our total dependence on the Lord for the great task He has given to us, and also feel that time is running out to take the glad news to so many who are willing to hear.

ROMANIA Pop. 19.5 Mil. UK 4 Ploiesti

In the initial phase of the war in Ukraine, many people entered Romania at three different border crossings (**Siret and Sighet** in the north as well as **Isaccea near Tulcea** in the south). Generally speaking, they were more well off and arrived in their own vehicles and had money, so they quickly moved on to other countries where they had relatives or friends.

Believers were waiting at borders with food, water, and essential

items, as well as offering transport to bus stations, train stations and airports for those without vehicles. Accommodation was offered to those who needed it, with many people only staying one or two nights.

After the initial influx, various centres for food and accommodation were set up by believers, businesspeople, and local authorities. Donation centres for food, clothing and finance have been set up in local shopping centres. The EU has set up a distribution hub near Suceava airport in the north. People of other nationalities who were living and studying in the Ukraine have left and where possible places are being found for them in schools and universities here if they wish to stay and continue their studies.

Assembly believers in Suceava, in the north of Romania, who speak Ukrainian, have been an enormous help as they co-ordinate different aspects of the relief work. This is the busiest crossing point.

After the first week as the bombardments worsened, many women and children crossed the border, arriving on foot with suitcases and bags, some having abandoned vehicles or public transport as the queues were stretching for miles. The weather turned much colder at this point and there were flurries of snow. Many of these are poorer people who have left everything behind and are exhausted and traumatized. Some need help to arrange onward travel as well as financial help to purchase tickets and obtain any further documentation necessary for travel. Others need accommodation on a long-stay basis as they have nowhere else to go, some prefer to be near the border so that they can return once the situation eases.

Humanitarian aid is being allowed into Ukrainian towns nearer the border in the north of Romania and assembly believers continue to purchase and take in food and essential items, on a daily basis, while it is still possible. Humanitarian aid convoys cross the border with an escort. Items delivered are being transported further into the Ukraine to where they are most needed.

ROMANIA Pop. 19.5 Mil. UK 4 Ploiesti

Believers are working extremely hard and pulling well together in this new and developing situation. People are being housed in church buildings, sports centres, schools, hotels and private homes.

Immediate help was necessary, and the Lord provided in wonderful ways through the generosity of His people. Even greater needs will follow and as plans and decisions are made for the future, much wisdom is needed.

Due to the influx of people, new beds and bedding needed to be purchased, and with a swift turn over in numbers, washing machines and driers have been working non-stop as well as heating systems. Recently a gift was passed on to purchase a new washing machine at one of the Christian centres.

Ukrainian people (believers and unbelievers) are attending assembly gatherings and being shown much love and kindness by believers. Some of those helping the Ukrainian people have their own personal needs too.

There is apprehension here as the war is in the neighbouring country. People were already concerned and economising due to the hefty increase in gas, electricity prices and food prices in recent months, and were thankful for a fairly mild winter. A cold spell is now sweeping through the country, accompanied by heavy snow showers in some parts.

At the beginning of March during our day visit to Suceava we saw the humanitarian aid being collected and taken to areas where it is needed. Our minds went back over 30 years to the time when this type of activity was taking place in the UK for Romania. Now the nation is moved and making every effort to meet the needs of those fleeing from war in a neighbouring country.

Owing to the generosity of the Lord's people in recent weeks our role has been to send finance to assembly believers in the north of Romania (Suceava and Sighet) to purchase food and essential items that are being taken across the border daily to help those who have remained in the Ukraine. Food and essential items have also been purchased to help the refugee work carried on by believers in Romania as well as help with travel costs for those in need.

We receive updates several times a day so that current needs can be met. Families arrive with just a suitcase, cold and hungry, some having walked for 3 days after their homes were destroyed. As the weather has turned cold and long queues have remained at the border, believers have been out offering warm clothing to those who need it as well as hot food.

Firstly, we want to thank you for supporting us in prayer through many changes during this past year.

We were in Thessaloniki in Northern Greece for ten weeks at the end of 2021. We are very glad that we could use our Irish passports which meant we had no need of a visa and could come and go as we please. We did however need to get into the Greek tax system to be able to rent a flat.

This proved to be very time consuming but with persistence and the help of Greek friends, Harry has got us into the system! He also got our vaccines from Afghanistan recognised in their system and we were even able to get our third booster in Thessaloniki! So we are very thankful that looking ahead we should be able to feel more settled in Greece.

It was quite daunting starting from scratch trying to find ways of meeting Afghans to be able to share Christ's love and word with them. So we volunteered in two centres that help the homeless and refugees, eighty percent of whom are Afghans, so our language skills were much in demand. We were able to help in the centres five days a week, where we prepared and distributed food along with clothes. It was great to be able to meet Afghans and talk with them in their own language. We want to build on these relationships when we return.

Harry also connected with Afghans in the main park in Thessaloniki and had some wonderful opportunities with families who were transiting from an island camp on their way to Germany.

He helped them get accommodation for the night as they had already slept out in the open and gave them a Gospel, making sure that they could get to the airport the next day. One of these men, Abdullah, is still in contact with Harry and wants to learn more about Christ after reading through the Gospel.

They have asked us to join them in the outreach to the camps and to reach out to refugees living in the the city and to help disciple new believers. We count it a privilege to help this key couple.

We have enjoyed our time at home with family and friends. We heard a couple of days ago that Harry's recent C.T. scans were clear. We are encouraged that with this clean bill of health we can now make plans to return to Greece at the start of March.

We hear regularly from our dear friends in Afghanistan. As you might imagine their situations are dire. The economy has collapsed and there is no work. We are able to send in money although this is now quite tightly controlled by the Taliban. Please pray especially for Stephanie's language teacher who although only twenty-five has cancer. She needs to go to Pakistan as there is no effective treatment available in the country. She and her brother have applied for passports, and we are doing all that we can to help and advise. Most of all please pray she sees her need of a loving caring Saviour. She has been privileged to hear the gospel.

Harry's language teacher who is a believer has also applied for a passport as he and his family fear to stay. Not only is he a secret believer but his wife was a policewoman. They are now living in a remote village as this is safer. How incredibly sad it all is to be living in Afghanistan in these days.

In addition to my writing commitments, I am busy most Lord's Days with 'Drive-in Gospel' meetings. It connects well with 'street preaching'. Some brothers like the platform, I enjoy the challenge of outdoors, and quite a few assemblies here have continued with 'Drive-in' opportunities in carparks, yards and so forth through the winter, and even now that halls are open again. Many are still hearing who would never come inside.

From a street-work point of view I try to manage 4 trips each year to the West and South of Ireland. I do this in fellowship with Jonathan Goodwin, a brother from Collooney, who is a window cleaner by trade, but a street worker by calling – and gifted too. They do 6,000 homes in Nov-Dec in Sligo County with calendars, which I have helped with since 2015. I have the use of a 2-berth caravan, so we go twice a year into the Munster Province and preach in the cities there. Cork and Limerick are very open to the gospel, even among students, in a way that all

parts of the UK are not. This is a 'new door' unknown previously. I will be down again with the caravan in May, God willing.

Pray for Neill (a recent convert from a paramilitary background), for Tara and Victoria (a convert who got away from the Lord due to strong pressure in the South of Ireland, and is coming slowly back), for Brian, for Steve, for Susie, for Nathan and Lindsay. All of these are close contacts (though some far away geographically) who all requested the book ('End Times for Beginners') and are reading it.

In August and September Helen will join me (with the caravan) for a lengthy preaching / ministry tour of the Highlands, the Orkneys, and the Hebrides. I try to get to the 'far north' once a year as well, though 2021 was missed out due to Covid.

We also had plans for a lengthy visit to the interior of British Columbia, Canada, where I had been doing a lot of outreach and gospel work pre-covid. Some of the assemblies are terribly isolated - as much as 1,000k apart - and very little to encourage. They need prayer and support. Though it looks as if things are not as 'settled' there as here, we may have to schedule for spring 23, God willing.

Last month we visited a couple of mountain towns with some of our remaining calendars. In the towns of Xico and Xico Viejo we have quite a number of contacts who were happy to receive us into their homes to hear the Gospel. It's quite incredible to be among people who live in simple homes stuck together with wooden pallets and corrugated iron sheets. Their obvious materialistic disadvantage is a real advantage for us as we seek to see them won to Christ. Cars are rare, internet non-existent, but they have a whole lot more than those who live here in the city - a hunger for God's word. Pray for a young mother named Francisca. It was a pleasant surprise to see the words of 1 Corinthians 15v3 written on the door of her mother-in-law's home: 'Christ died for our sins according to the Scriptures'. That provided enough to converse about the work of the Lord Jesus on Calvary's cross. What an encouragement to hear her tell us again, after perhaps a year since we last spoke, that she is depending upon Christ and His sacrifice. This is a truth she understood during one of our first visits back in April 2020 as she overheard us explaining the meaning of her mother-in-law's name - Grace! Truly amazing grace!

Yesterday we travelled 1hr 20mins to a town called Libres. It's located in desert conditions at about 2,350m above sea level. Due to the blazing sun overhead, we sought refuge under a shadow in the central park to preach the Gospel. As we placed the 'Gospel trumpet' to our lips so to speak, desiring that there wouldn't be any uncertain sound, people drew near to listen and then to ask questions afterwards. Later we visited the home of some contacts for a Gospel meeting, which concluded with two women asking how they could obtain eternal life. Pray for the salvation of Anita and Irene. They are sisters and have eight children between them. Further evidence that God is working among these precious souls was seen as we departed – they asked when we'd return to preach God's word.
