SRI LANKA Pop. 21 Mil.

(Notes on a recent visit, our brother Jack's twenty seventh to Sri Lanka)

After a two-year absence because of COVID-19, it was a great joy to return to Sri Lanka at the end of May, this time accompanied by Leonard Currie of LWT. The visit was in real doubt because of the current economic and political situation on the island. There is much hardship on account of shortages of fuel, bottled gas to cook with, and escalating food prices. Unrest on the streets and constant power cuts were other factors to take into account. In preparation for our visit, the believers spent many hours queuing for diesel and hoarding it in cans to allow us to visit the east of the island.

With that background, we have to record our gratitude to God, that our whole schedule went ahead without any hindrances, and generally, attendances were larger than ever experienced previously. Both weekends were spent with the assembly in Colombo commencing with ministry at a brother's home on the Friday evening with 80/100 present in his main room and in his yard. The Saturday morning children's work in the Dematagoda area has doubled in numbers to over 100, and a highlight was the fact that around 50 parents from that work were at Bethesda for the Sunday Gospel meeting for the first time.

Saturday afternoons brought around 120 children to the hall, again a considerable increase from pre-covid days. The youth Gospel meeting had around 50/60 present, many of them not saved. On our second weekend, at the Gospel Meeting we had the joy of witnessing the baptism of three young people.

SRI LANKA Pop. 21 Mil.

(Notes on a recent visit, our brother Jack's twenty seventh to Sri Lanka)

We set out for the east of the island early on the Monday morning and broke our journey for a meeting at Kuranegula where there is a fairly new assembly. It was good to be in their new hall, kindly financed by saints in the UK. A few hours later, and many miles to the east, we met with the saints at Alamkulam, with around 70 present in a hall which required a recent extension because of increased numbers.

Next day, a full day of conference was held at Valaichchenai, with over 500 present. At the end of the day, a food distribution was made when around 300 sacks of provisions were given to saints from outlying areas. The local believers received theirs subsequently. The Lord's people in the West have been very generous in financing this, the latest of a number of food distributions on the island. Much effort goes in to sourcing the supplies, gathering them in to Bethesda, dividing them up, and transporting them to the various parts of the island where the sacks are then filled.

Other places that we visited on the east coast were Mutuchchenai, Palchchenai, Ralodai, and Vaddavan where two were baptized in the river after a meeting in a jungle clearing.

On returning to Colombo, we made one more trip for a Gospel meeting at Badureliya where there is a relatively new assembly. In the initial work there, the saints were greatly helped by visits from Charles Davidson (N Ireland) and local brother Ajith Pieris. The believers have experienced constant harassment, and they switch around their meeting venues to remain as "invisible" as possible. So that evening our meeting was in the jungle, up a hill, and under a corrugated iron shelter; quite an adventure! Do pray for Sri Lanka. C. 1973 13/6/22 JACK & LILLIAN HAY

ZAMBIA Pop. 18 Mil. UK 40 Writing from Scotland

(Compiled from various social media reports)

Rosemary Summers (Alan Summers' wife) went to visit missionary friends in Zambia on 23 May, along with her 80-year-old mum, Margaret Craig (Leslie Craig's mum). They were helping to bring back Betty Magennis to N Ireland after faithfully serving the Lord at Dipalata for 46 years.

Rosemary and her mum made a visit to Chauvuma with Jeff and Mary Speichinger, US missionaries serving the Lord in Zambia. On their way home at dusk, a child ran out in front of Jeff's vehicle and was tragically killed. The Africans immediately started to attack them.

They broke the windows round them and started hitting them and throwing stones at them. They were determined to kill them, but Jeff drove off.

One of tyres was burst so he couldn't go fast. Jeff stopped after about 5km to change the tyre and the mob caught up. Jeff was pulled from the car and beaten. Rosemary and Margaret were attacked again and hit with sticks. They were terrified. Rosemary was trying to protect her mother with a shovel in the truck as she was being hit about the head.

Eventually, the police came and took them to Zambezi. Jeff was detained but eventually Rosemary and Margaret ware taken to Chitokoloki so David McAdam could check them out. Both were extremely shaken and very sore, but mercifully had no major injuries. They have now returned to the UK. The mental and emotional scars will take some time to fully assess.

Obviously, the child being killed is a tragedy. But the subsequent attack by a mob of villagers was obviously deeply shocking and disturbing. Please pray for Rosemary and Margaret and the family of the little boy. Please also remember Jeff Speichinger and his family, together with other believers working in the area.

PERU Pop. 32.5 Mil. UK2 Lima

The weekly market work in Lima is encouraging. I have a small book stand with free literature and a gospel banner that I take to various markets across the city on different days during the week. Many people approach me seeking spiritual help and guidance and I have received a number of further requests for literature and Bibles. It is a great joy to see spiritual thirst in Perú, but it brings us great sadness to see the large number of churches who preach a prosperity gospel, with the true intent of only lining their own pockets. Many are deceived and confused by what they have heard and experienced. I hope to commence a small monthly gospel paper and also a magazine for believers in the next few months. This will allow a constant supply of literature to pass on to a number of contacts that we have.

Four weeks ago, we commenced a new work in an area called El Cinco. It is in an open yard, granted to us by a local soup kitchen. We have been glad to have about 15 children and 7 adults. They are slowly becoming accustomed to bringing their homework and learning their memory verse each week. New children have been attending each week – the area is quite tough, though the people are very respectful of the Gospel preached in the open air. We also continue to visit a number of soup kitchens in the district of Santa Clara where we live. There has been a sharp increase in food prices, and this has meant that quite a few soup kitchens have closed.

PERU Pop. 32.5 Mil. UK2 Lima

Our Saturday children's meeting in Alto Priale has been a great encouragement, with a weekly attendance of around 60 children and adults. Some new children have come to the area, and this has increased our numbers. At Jicamarca our numbers have also increased, and we have been delighted to have around 12 mothers each week, most of whom are keen to repeat their memory verse along with the children! This week we ran out of chairs, which is a wonderful problem to have, with over 60 present. After completely refurbishing a former garage, we now have a very nice hall which we use each Lord's Day evening for a Gospel meeting. Unfortunately, the new floor cracked owing to a recent earthquake. The hall is on a very busy road and many who pass by are able to see the 3 large Scripture Texts outside of the hall. Please pray for one family who have come faithfully to each Sunday night meeting and have brought their 4 daughters on some occasions. We are also glad that one of the families who live above the hall have started to attend each Sunday night. Whilst we would like to see more coming to hear the Gospel each Lord's Day, we are very thankful for the unsaved who come to hear the message.

During the month of April, I was able to visit the assembly in La Arena, Piura. I had a week of ministry for the believers there, who seemed to appreciate the visit very much. My oldest boy John accompanied me. The assembly is located about 18 hours away from Lima, in the north of the country. Our nearest assembly is around 4 hours away, so it is a rare privilege to attend other gatherings. Temperatures were extremely high, but it was a great honour to remember the Lord in the breaking of bread after not having this privilege in nearly 3 years. We also hope to commence another children's work in a district called Santa Rosa de Americas, but at present have not found a suitable place to hold it. Please pray that the Lord would open a door for us to commence this new work.

SCOTLAND Pop. 5.5 Mil. Lanarkshire

The last few weeks have been very busy with Gospel meetings, drive-ins and schools. We had Craig MacKie's portable hall in Chapelton (Strathaven) for a fortnight of children and gospel meetings. We also held an OAP lunch meeting each week. Unfortunately, despite good support from believers, we did not get many unbelievers at any of the meetings.

Last year we had good drive-in meetings at a local garden centre, and we were granted permission again for this year. We commenced with an outreach day to get as much of the locality covered with flyers and tracts.

The drive-ins went very well, and we only had one night with no unbelievers and the rest of the 8 nights we had many present. One evening we had 26 unbelievers which was very encouraging. We look to the Lord to bless the work done.

We have permission to use the garden centre's sister site for more drive-in meetings early autumn.

Blair Martin and I have been having monthly drive-ins at Polkemmet Country Park (Whitburn) and will have a month of Sundays in August. We get a good number attending plus many people milling around the park; often people stop and listen for the duration. Next week we will also be holding a Children's Bible Club week in the same park. We will be talking a minibus each night from Plains and so will the assembly at Whitburn.

July and August sees camp work recommence. We have a full senior camp and good interest for other events over the summer. God willing, we have a week of holiday Bible Club at Plains, Ayrshire and Orkney, an Outreach week at St Andrews and meetings planned in Newton Stewart at the end of August. We also have some gala and fete days to visit with the trailer; it's good to see these events happening again!

We will also be back at the Edinburgh Tattoo with 40,000 John 3v16 bags, these have been sitting for 2 years waiting to go!

The schoolwork is drawing to a close for the term. Since Christmas it has been flat out with assemblies and class talks. Next year is looking to be very busy with many schools booked in already. Amazing to think of so many youngsters hearing about the Lord.

We have been able to source a container to fill and ship to CMI Aid in Moldova. This is in addition to the 3 trucks already sent. We will be concentrating on NEW Children's Toys, Stationery & Schooling Supplies. If you are interested in donating, please get in touch and we can advise exactly what is required.

DEM. REP. OF CONGO Pop. 86 Mil. UK 3 Lubumbashi Ephphata School continues to be a place of joy, where deaf children blossom as they learn to communicate and make sense of the confusing, isolating world in which they live. It is very satisfying to see them developing friendships, and, as many of them do, choosing to develop a personal relationship with the Greatest of all Friends.

The workshop for qualified deaf carpenters is now called "Ephphata Creations" and is slowly establishing itself. Currently, under Isazu's leadership, they are repairing benches for a primary school and also have an order from an entrepreneur who is building a few flats in Lubumbashi, to make some doors, beds, wardrobes and kitchen cupboards. Their prayer is to become more widely known and to build up their supply of tools and equipment. There is no mains electricity, and so they are delighted with the gift of a generator for their power tools.

Providing enough wood for Ephphata School's current carpentry students, as well as Ephphata Creations, is a challenge. God answered prayer in an unusual way recently when the driver of a truck laden with wood from the interior changed his route to avoid a confrontation with the road police and then broke down a 5-minute drive from the school. With no money to pay for the major truck repairs, the crew were obliged to look for clients to buy the wood. They were soon knocking on the school gate offering as much wood as we wanted at a very reasonable price and minimal transport costs!

Bel-Air Primary School has been neglected for many years (before and after the director's death) and is in a very run-down and dilapidated state. Paulin recently gave up a prestigious job at a private city centre school to become Bel-Air's headteacher and is facing an enormous task. To date, Ephphata Creations has helped by repairing over 30 desks and benches.

Free education in government primary schools is wonderful in increasing the number of children in education. However, without an increase in the number of teachers and facilities, crowded classrooms are the norm. Luapula School has 3 classrooms and 1,033 children registered in 6 grades, including 245 in the 1st

grade! Over a year ago, 2 mining companies agreed to fund the construction of more classrooms, but the funds (transferred to the government) have not yet been dispersed. In spite of the difficulties, the dedication of Tumbwe, the head teacher, and his staff is enormously encouraging. It is a privilege to also support the spiritual aims of the school through the weekly visit of Delphin, a children's evangelist.

Last week, the builder working on repairs at Restawhile received the devastating news that his son had been killed by drunken workmates coming to the house to steal his wages ... less than £20! From time-to-time sleep is disturbed by the sound of gunshots, but we thank the Lord that to date we have been spared a bandit attack that so many others have endured. A friend told me that after midnight they rarely get any sleep until 4-5 am as they are constantly on alert for the frequent visits of armed bandits in the vicinity. Please also remember the Papillon Medical Centre and the prison ministry in your prayers.

Having now spent one month in Mexico, we feel more than ever the need to gain the Spanish language. Every activity is so dependent upon it: whether preaching; teaching; praying in the assembly gatherings; trying to follow comments in the Bible reading; visitation work; having believers round for a meal... everything requires it! We are halfway through the first of six levels of the Spanish programme we are on and, while we have made some progress, there is much to learn.

Brother Duncan Beckett was present to lead the Bible reading on 1 Peter chapter 1, and it was good to be able to meet this brother who has been in Mexico for a number of years. The work is large and varied, with people coming and going all the time. Since our arrival, a man by the name of José has been coming well to all the meetings. Another family attended the meetings for the first time on Lord's Day past, a former Baptist pastor with his wife and two teenage boys were also there. So, there is a wide spectrum!

Following the very encouraging outreach meetings in a tent at Mabuo, we had another short series of meetings with the saints in the Serowe Assembly in their GorraLeina Hall on the south side of Serowe. It was good to see precious souls gathered night by night and the Lord gave abundant help in the preaching. We continue to go over to Serowe for their Thursday evening Prayer Meeting and Ministry Meeting.

BRAZIL Pop. 214 Mil. UK 20 Bahia

We are all well here and thankful for the many opportunities to make known the truth of the Gospel in different towns in Bahia. In São Cristóvão, Salvador, where the assembly meets, the meetings continue as normal. We have been encouraged with the children's meeting there on Thursday evenings where we have an average of 70 young people attending. All of them live within walking distance of the hall, which is in one of the most dangerous shanty towns of Salvador. It would be great to see them saved not only for eternity but also from the vices of crime and violence that are all around them, and which have become more shocking in recent times.

The four weekly meetings in Candeias continue much as normal. There are a few people there who profess to be saved, some have been baptized and others show a consistent interest. Please pray for further progress in this town of 90,000 inhabitants.

At the end of April, we had the privilege of commencing another new work in the region. We have rented a hall in the town of São Sebastião do Passé and are being encouraged with an excellent number of adults and children who pay reverent attention as they hear the Gospel for the first time. We have a number of interesting contacts in this new town, but they are all spread out over a wide area, and none of them have any means of transport, which presents quite a challenge for having meetings. Recently we printed 200,000 copies of a 16-page booklet which is really a collection of Gospel tracts. These are being distributed all over Brazil and we trust that the printed page will be used to the blessing of many. The publishing work has long since outgrown the size of our present premises. We have purchased a site near our home and plan to build a suitable store which will be more adequate for the storage and handling of the literature for Brazil and Angola. More than ever, we realise that your continued prayers are a vital part of the work here.

Along with the home and the children, Trena has been seeking to spend more time visiting with the sisters of various assemblies and working with some of the younger believers.

Many children hear and study the Word on a weekly basis and sometimes the men are asked to speak at the parent/teacher meetings, so it is a great opportunity to present the Gospel to the adults.

The small boat Sergio is getting made locally is in the finishing stages and plans are being made for the first trip. He will need the help of suitable local brethren to accompany him. His desire is to reach out to the large villages along the banks of the Tapajos and Arapiuns rivers, which run into the Amazon just above Santarém. There are no assemblies yet in these villages. We pray for the Lord's guidance and protection and the salvation of many souls.

We are all keeping well, and all is currently quiet in Lutsk. We have been bombed 3 times over the past 14 weeks, but the past weeks have been peaceful, apart from the sirens sounding. Lutsk is still well fortified with military blockades and checkpoints on every main road. Curfew is still in place and streets are so dark without lights at night.

We keep very busy at the hall and have all our assembly meetings as usual on Lord's Day and Thursday evening, with big numbers attending. It's so good to all be together. We had a good number out today with so many unsaved attending. We look to the Lord to save those who attend the meetings. We are focusing on the local assembly in Lutsk and the work which goes on from the hall here. Days are very long and busy, but we are happy being where the Lord has placed us to be a testimony for Him.

The Gospel Hall here has been a blessing to so many. It's open from early morning until late evening. Some kids/teenagers stay here all day, every day. It's great to have somewhere where we all feel safe and loved. It's just like a big family, and everyone is helping each other!

We have now collected from the printers 20,000 of a new little Gospel card printed on both sides to distribute with our aid. It's all about HOPE. It is very relevant for the situation people are facing in Ukraine. It's a good size for giving to people and also for people to have in pockets etc. We have over 250,000 Ukrainian Gospel tracts as well available. What a privilege it is to share the Best News with so many people in these sad and tragic circumstances. We pray that many will be saved at this time.

We are getting lots of refugees and pensioners coming in for hot meals every day. There are now approx. 50,000 refugees in Lutsk. We have approximately 240 coming in each day. Many of these dear refugees are so traumatised and have heart-breaking stories. Many have husbands/sons/brothers on the front line and don't know exactly where they are. It's great to see a lot of these dear Ukrainians coming to the meetings now. We long to hear of them getting saved. Many are also taking Gospel tracts from the stand, and some have taken Bibles. They all see the Gospel verses on the walls as they come upstairs too.

Please continue to pray for Pasha. He's just 21 and is a refugee from Zaporizhzhia in the East. He was able to get to Lutsk 11 weeks ago. His mother, grandmother and 2 sisters can't leave their town as it's now surrounded by Russian soldiers. Pasha saw the billboards in Lutsk offering free meals and he has been with us every day since. He actually helps us now with the aid and stays with us at the hall every day. We were able to get him clothes and food as he arrived in Lutsk with nothing. He has come to every meeting, and we would long to see him saved. Pasha's dad passed away 3 weeks ago from lung cancer. He was only 50. Pasha couldn't get to the funeral as his hometown is surrounded and is frequently bombed. Please pray for this lovely young man who we have come to know well.

Please pray for Ira too. She's from Chernihiv and is in Lutsk with her 2 sons. Her husband is somewhere on the front line, but she doesn't know where. She can contact him very seldom and it's very difficult for her. Her cousin was seriously injured in a bombing 3 weeks ago. He's very ill. Please pray for these dear families. Ira attends all the meetings, and we would long to see her and her family saved.

God never ceases to amaze us with His timing and care! A friend in Ireland texted us a few weeks ago about getting aid to a Ukrainian family in Kharkiv. The family have an adult disabled daughter and she can't get to the basement for shelter, so they go down there but just have to leave her in bed covered with a blanket in the apartment. Heart-breaking! She badly needed a wheelchair among other things. We unloaded our 9th lorry load of aid sent from Northern Ireland 3 weeks ago and what did we find - a beautiful modern wheelchair!! We hadn't asked for one, but God knew!! Amazing! We were able to send 10 boxes of aid plus a wheelchair to Kharkiv and it all arrived safely. The family are so happy and thanked us for the Bibles and Gospel literature too.

We have a great hymn singing and Prayer meeting every Thursday evening. These times are so special. Then we all enjoy a hot meal together. It's just amazing to look around at everyone, some from Lutsk, some refugees from the East from the last Russian invasion, some former street kids now saved, baptised and in fellowship, and all, with us, enjoying the Lord's presence and His peace. It's only our God could ever make this scenario possible!

Work is progressing well at the orphanage. We have 19 builders

working flat out to try to get it all finished as soon as possible. Still the ground floor and basement need to be finished. Some materials are difficult to source now due to the war, but we are doing everything possible to see the orphanage ready to be opened.

It's very difficult to get fuel now for the car. Most petrol stations have no fuel and for those that do, we can get just 20 litres. One of our friends queued for 3 hours recently to get his 20 litres. Anatoly queued from 4.30am one morning to get petrol when the petrol station opened at 6am! We pray that this fuel shortage will soon be rectified.

Rhoda and I decided to take 31 friends, some from the assembly, and some refugees to the Carpathian Mountains for a 4 day break last week. Everyone was so exhausted working very long hours every day and we felt it would be good to give all the hard workers a nice break. We had an amazing time and it felt so normal with no sirens sounding, no check points and no soldiers patrolling. We stopped off to see Dima in Ivano Frankivsk assembly on the way down. It was so nice to spend some time there. We had to take cans of extra petrol in the boot of the cars as it's so difficult to get fuel. The bus driver had extra fuel too. We are now back into routine here in Lutsk and very busy but we all really enjoyed 4 days away.

We really enjoyed having Esther with us for 6 days! She flew over from USA with car parts that we desperately need! We drove to Warsaw to collect her and drove straight back to Lutsk arriving back here at 1.30am! It's a 6 hour journey each way plus border crossings. Esther helped us each day, so it wasn't much of a holiday for her! We were so happy to have her here for this short time. Esther arrived safely back in USA yesterday.

We close with sincere thanks to you all for praying and for keeping in touch. We are so thankful to still have electricity and internet. Please pray that we will all have good health and the strength to keep working for our Saviour.
