VENEZUELA Pop. 28.5 Mil. UK 7 Los Altos

During the month of September, we were in Cumana city visiting the brethren. It was a joy to find them faithful and steadfast in the Lord. For a little over two weeks, we were able to share in gospel and ministry. Mr Noel McKeown was able to join us and be of much help. The first Saturday in October we were invited to join the brethren in Carupano, 130 km east of Cumana; it had been 25 years since the assembly was established. Due to road conditions, it is nearly a three-hour road journey. It was a very special day beginning with a Bible Reading in the morning, Ministry in the afternoon and Gospel and Baptisms in the evening. Our coworker Mr. William Turkington made an even longer journey to be there. What a joy to see how the Lord has maintained and allowed growth in this place; the Assembly currently has about 45 in fellowship.

On Sunday morning we once again accompanied the brethren in Cumana; they meet for a devotional time then teaching. Mr. Valentin said farewell amidst tears; they are just a few believers in Cumana and appreciate every visit, but school was restarting, and we had to return home. In Cumana there is yet no assembly. We have tried to buy a site to build a Hall, but nothing suitable has been found. We trust the Lord will allow us the privilege of seeing a work established for the glory of God.

The second Saturday of October we were in Zaraza, Guarico State, four hours west of home on an extremely deteriorated road. The little assembly of Zaraza had been four years established and it is the time when we can have fellowship with them. From the different assemblies in the Northeast, two buses and two trucks travelled full of brethren, about 100 people in total. Some came from other areas also, and we were able to see different workers we hadn't seen in a long time due to restrictions.

We ask you to continue remembering the work of the Lord in Venezuela; covid restrictions have been letting up and special reunions like monthly ministry meetings and conferences are recommencing throughout the country. This is encouraging for the Lord's people, who continue to suffer due to the high cost of living and restricted fuel supply; His word is a balm that comforts our hearts.

ENGLAND Pop. 56 Mil. Lancashire

Christian Care and Share Foodbank was started in February 2021, with a vision to share the gospel with people, as well as help to meet their daily food needs. One of the verses of scripture adopted as a guiding principle as spoken by our Lord Jesus Christ

is, "Man shall not live by bread alone but by every word of God." (Luke 4v4) Over the months the work has grown, and the need is increasing more and more. Over 100 individuals have been reached to date. Every weekly food parcel includes a gospel leaflet. Opportunity for people to share their problems and for us to share the gospel are given. There are some who have food delivered, others collect from the foodbank based at the assembly hall (Cumberland Chapel). It is usual for around 50 people to receive help weekly (23 to 25 households). Food is sourced from supermarkets, a Blackpool food bank warehouse, and occasional donations from some local people. What basic food is not donated is purchased each week.

The charity is overseen by 6 trustees, and practically run by Neal & Christine Hartridge, ably assisted by 2 volunteers from the local Cleveleys assembly, and a gentleman volunteering who shows interest in the gospel, but as yet is not saved. Referrals come from social services, DWP, local doctors and housing associations. We cover the Cleveleys area of Lancashire, north of Blackpool. On the edge of our border with Blackpool we have 11 clients who live in abject poverty in pretty run-down flats. These people are those the world despises, but over the months we have built up a rapport with them. There are some sad stories, and many have had very difficult lives. Recently, we were able to hand out some warm fleece blankets to them, and their gratitude was very evident and quite moving. Please especially pray for a Christmas outreach we plan to have with these particular clients on 23rd December, inviting them to a buffet lunch across the road in a local hotel, gifting them each a Christmas box, and taking opportunity to present the gospel with a short message preached. One lady K. was so touched we would do this for them. She told Christine it was her birthday that day, and she'd been raised by her grandmother, and never had a birthday party in her life. As the energy and cost of living crisis becomes more of a reality, we can already see an increased demand on foodbank help being needed. People are telling us their income doesn't stretch to heating and eating, and where children are involved, they become desperate.

Pray for the continued work, for wisdom and necessary resources to continue to meet needs, but particularly for spiritual blessing, that as the gospel is shared, dear ones will be saved and follow on to know the Lord and His Word.

The past couple of months have been challenging for various reasons, but through it all we have known His care and nearness, for which we're so thankful.

I'm looking forward to going on the road tomorrow to northern Ontario. Charlton assembly has asked for a week of ministry, so I will be away from 9th – 23rd November, God willing. *Prayer* would be appreciated for good driving conditions for this time of the year (we had our first snow on Sunday) and that this visit will be a real encouragement to them. We're hoping friends from three neighbouring assemblies will swell the numbers each night. I plan to have a separate visit with each of these for ministry, along with three more assemblies enroute, so prayer for freshness and the right word for each company would also be greatly appreciated. As Elaine has preparations to do for our final PBS Mailout in December, which is the biggest of the year, she is staying by the 'stuff'. Over 1800 students continue to receive the lessons. We're thankful to keep well and if I'm honest, I'm sorry she isn't accompanying me, as over the past 3 years we have hardly been separated!

Finally, this past week the 700th COMPASS POINT program was recorded. Unfortunately, I haven't been able to get ahead again, so I have some tight scheduling while I'm away, to keep on track. Please *pray* that I will be able to meet the deadlines. This will be the first time I have recorded away from my study. We're truly thankful to the Lord for all His help and provision that enables His Word to be aired each day across our province and down in the West Indies. We would love to know what impact they are having in people's lives, but we leave this in the Lord's hands.

This week we submitted our application to the Royal Manitoba Winter Fair. We haven't attended since 2019, so we're *praying* we'll get our usual site back and that this event at the end of March 2023 will be a blessing to many. We are aiming to focus in part on the radio outreach this time.

On my return, besides the final PBS mailout, I have one more series of children's meetings with the assembly in Mitchell, Manitoba. (Dec. 5th - 9th) *Prayer* would be valued for my preparation and for good local interest. We also need to implement a new safeguarding policy for PBS, which entails quite a bit of planning. It has been in the works for several months, but time and other things have hindered us, so please *pray* that we shall be able to do this before the end of the year.

We're truly grateful for your ongoing prayerful interest and thank God for the fellowship of so many, over our many years in His work.

SCOTLAND Pop. 5.5 Mil. Ayrshire

Numbers are increasing at both the foodbanks that we operate, here in Auchinleck and in Muirkirk. It is a lot of time-consuming work, collecting food in Glasgow, purchasing food locally as well as sorting it all out and clearing it all away each week. However, it is definitely worth it, as every week at both locations, we see a good number of people gathering to hear the Gospel. Last week there were 18 present listening to the message in Muirkirk alone, each giving exceptional attention to the Word. So, between the two places around 25 to 30 people hear the gospel each week and between 35 to 45 receive provisions. At Auchinleck we predominantly get addicts at the food bank, as Mary and I would know most of the addicts in the community and that was our main sphere of ministry for many years. Unfortunately, I think their presence makes it more difficult for other folks to come in although over recent weeks we have been getting a number of older people and single mums. At Muirkirk we get a few addicts but a good number of older folks as well as a number of single parents or parents of young children. We have a number of folks weighing heavy on or hearts that we would love to see saved. Please pray for them. Most of them hear the Gospel every week, either at the food bank or at the family service on a Sunday.

On Monday past we had our monthly coffee morning. Seven local women were present, eleven were present the month before, some who had never been in the hall before. We are praying that these many contacts will lead to not only conversations but conversions!!

We had an Open Day at the hall in the summer and a large number of children and adults were present. Twice during the afternoon we got everybody into the hall, young and old, and we conducted a 15/20 minute children's meeting. Dozens of people heard the Gospel, many possibly for the first time. One mother came with her children to the family service the next day.

At the end of July Mary and I attended an assembly camp in

Romania. It was over 12 years since I last visited the saints at Ploiesti and it was a great thrill to be able to meet up with them again. Prayer would be appreciated that the Bible teaching will have had an impact on many lives, especially the young ones who were present. A couple of mornings some believers from Sibiu joined us. They informed me it was 30 years since I had last visited them, so it was really good to see them again.

Earlier in the year we attended a weekend retreat with a group of Asian believers. It was held in a lovely campsite in Yorkshire. I think there was about 60 folks there and it was a blessing to be with them and to share in the ministry. The times of prayer were quite special. It was a really busy weekend. The first meeting on the Sunday was at 7.30am and we didn't leave the meeting hall until 10.30pm!

The last weekend of this month I am responsible for a Youth Weekend in Northern Ireland. The subject is "Young Lives Yielded to God." Really burdened about the meetings and don't want them to be another talking shop - we are looking for life changing encounters with God!!

A few weeks ago, Lucie and Lewis, two of our grandchildren, (Douglas and Mandy's children) were baptised. It was a great privilege to speak and to see the hall well-filled, especially to see so many young folks present. I felt the Lord gave help and we look to Him for fruit in the lives of those who listened.

Phoebe, our 11-year-old granddaughter, (Calum and Ruth's daughter) has asked to be baptised. I spoke to her on Friday evening, being very conscious of her age. I asked her why she wanted baptised, and she told me she had been reading the book of Esther. She said Esther was part of the people of God although she was married to an ungodly king. The time came, she said, when Esther had to make known who she was, even if it meant she lost her life. Phoebe said it was time for people to know who she was. I felt I could hardly put her off being baptised in spite of her young age!!

We are grateful to the Lord for His grace.

MALAWI Pop. 19 Mil. Writing from N Ireland

We were back in Malawi for Malawi Gospel Outreach (MGO) 2022 - joined by 20 overseas visitors for 2 weeks of Gospel outreach, based at the recently acquired site at Saidi.

School term was extended to compensate for Covid closures earlier in the year. Although this frustrated our plan to run a daily Bible club, we adapted and took the program into 6 local schools, which worked exceptionally well.

Thousands of school children heard the Gospel. Each Child received a Seed Sower text and Acts 16:31 Exercise Book. We also held several Open-Air meetings, and praise God for the large crowds who stopped to listen.

The volunteers distributed invitations to special Gospel meetings at Saidi. The interest was such that we extended the series by a further week. There were many new faces, and it's encouraging to learn that numbers continue to increase at the regular weekly Gospel meeting

We visited a local farm prison and the entire prison population (over 300 men) sat in the afternoon sun and listened as the Gospel was presented. Conditions in the prison are appalling, and we were happy to leave a gift of a bed mat, a bar of soap, and a Seed Sower text with each prisoner.

The highlight of MGO was the Children's Day at Saidi. It's just

two years since we made the first land purchase there. Since then, the Lord has blessed, and we have been able to extend and start developing the site. That Saturday our eyes melted with joy as we saw the vision start to materialise.

There was some anxiety as our estimate of 200 children was exceeded by 400 - a great problem to have! The site was teeming with youngsters. By God's grace each child received a nutritious meal, heard the Gospel and went home with a Bible craft by which to remember the day.

This has encouraged us to forge ahead with plans to develop the work at Saidi. Around 50% of the Malawi population is under 18 years. We have a perfect opportunity to reach many of them with the Gospel before their lives are forever marred by sin.

I have postponed a planned visit to Malawi in December as the country is in the grip of a crippling fuel crisis. Please pray for guidance regarding further trips in the new year for Bible teaching and to supervise the building work, God willing.

ZAMBIA Pop. 18 Mil. UK 40 Writing from the US

Thank you so much for your prayers for Tim's recent trip to Zambia. It was very special for him to be back again at Loloma after a year of starting to settle into America. Here are a few highlights from the Zambian trip.

- 1. A gospel outreach in a remote area called Kanonesha, which due to the road conditions took 12 hours to drive there from Loloma. It is an area that Tim has visited in the past for local assembly conferences, but never had the opportunity to share the gospel throughout the villages there. It was therefore a great joy to be there for that purpose with 5 local believers he has worked with over the years. For 4 days they followed the usual schedule of prayer time at 6:30am, followed by an hour of bible study together with the local Christians. Then for the rest of each day they split into 3 groups, spending many valuable hours in presenting the gospel in many different village areas. During each evening they finishing with a gospel message to large crowds that gathered. Despite the 2 long days of travelling there and back, it was a real privilege for him to be back in village work again.
- 2. A short visit to Chavuma, Dipalata, and Chitokoloki, both to catch up with some of the fellow workers in those places and also for Seth (a visitor) to see different parts of the Lord's work in North Western Province. The needs and opportunities continue to be many, especially in the mission hospitals. Among other things at Chavuma, a special devotion time was had with about 100 of the midwifery students who are attending the nursing college there.
- 3. One Sunday was spent at Kayombo, about 2.5 hours drive from Loloma. Initially, meeting at the local assembly there in the morning, then in the afternoon spending time at the Boarding School. It was a real pleasure to see the 390 pupils from the school attending the gospel meeting held by the local assembly, and then to also have a brief time to encourage them all spiritually in the afternoon. We are thankful that a number of new teachers have been sent to the school, so pray that they will settle in well and be a blessing in the work there. The great opportunities to impact these many students with the Word of God continue. The practical needs of the road, water & power supply, and the cell network are also there, but we thank the Lord for some progress with the water supply. It was good to see our first ex pupil returning to volunteer as a teacher. He

- graduated from the school about 4 years ago, has obtained his teaching degree and now returned with a burden to support and strengthen the foundation of the Kayombo school.
- 4. A 40th year celebration at Samafunda, the local camp and conference centre. This was held on the last day of an elders' conference there, and was a lovely opportunity to give thanks and praise to the Lord for His faithfulness during these many years. Through the many conferences held over the years, so many believers have been encouraged. Also, many school students have been brought to know the Lord through the camps that they have attended there. The celebration was immediately followed by a 3-day boys camp for grade 9&10 pupils, so a fitting conclusion to the celebration.
- 5. Being back with the hospital team at Loloma was also a special time, enjoying again the Monday and Friday morning staff devotions, and at times presenting the gospel throughout all the wards using the public address system. Special times were had in ward visitation where on one afternoon two ladies made a profession of faith in the Lord Jesus. We trust that they will prove to be genuine. While purchasing medicines has been a particularly large burden this year for the Loloma team and other financial needs, we continue to look in faith to the Lord to further his work through this great medical opportunity.

- 6. A couple of hours were spent visiting the ladies at the village for the elderly. When Tim first arrived at Loloma, those who were physically able came to greet him, but others were unable due to their old age. So, it was a joy to spend time to both encourage them and also share a little of what God has done for us in the last year. Another older sister in a local assembly is now living at the elderly village, due to the bad treatment she has received from her relatives, so that brings the current number to 20. We thank the Lord both for His continued faithfulness to this work, and also for the two local men who do a great job in looking after these elderly people.
- 7. Having time with the saints and fellow workers in the assembly at Loloma. It was a joy to see many aspects of the Lord's work continuing in the area. Unfortunately, Marian Ronald slipped and broke her wrist while Tim was there, so we pray for healing for her. Prayer is also valued for the Anderson family as they plan in the will of the Lord to relocate to Namibia, likely in the near future. While they will be missed at Loloma, we also recognize the need for them to follow the Lord's will for their lives.
- 8. Visited a couple of the local assemblies in the area. Teaching and encouragement in the many small local assemblies continues to be a large need in Zambia. While time only allowed a few to be visited, it was a joy to renew fellowship again with the saints from those assemblies. Many of them sent their greetings to the believers in the west.

Here in the US, where the spiritual needs are also many, we have the privilege of sharing God's Word in different places as the Lord gives opportunity. This has included a 10-day visit among some of the assemblies in Florida, a weekend retreat with an assembly in Philadelphia, and a recent conference in New Jersey. We have settled well into the assembly at York, being encouraged among other things to see the children's opportunities in the Sunday School, a Bible Adventure program on Tuesday mornings, and an

AWANA program on Wednesday evenings. We trust that the Lord will bring many of these children to know Him in their youth.

Our children are all doing well, having been in the US now for over a year. They all appreciate the fellowship in the local assembly here, and also the opportunities to visit other assemblies in the area. David continues to enjoy his work, gaining some very practical and hands on experience. Daniel recently began working with an ex-missionary from the Philippines who specialises in house maintenance. So, he is starting to learn various practical tasks like carpentry, painting, plumbing and a bit of electrics. We thank the Lord for this opening for him especially knowing that his boss is committed to the Lord and so will be a good spiritual influence for Daniel. Kara is working hard in her grade 11 home schooling and has also begun a part time job in a café. So, life is changing for them all.

In closing we appreciate as always, your ongoing prayers both for us during this time of settling into a different life in America, and also for the work of the Lord in Zambia.

Priscilla and I visited Zambia for a few weeks between October and November. Our previous visit was just before the Coronavirus outbreak, and we are deeply thankful to the Lord for the opportunity to be there again. As in many other parts of the world, the pandemic caused many difficulties to the assemblies and to individuals and families. Thankfully, meeting schedules in the places we visited have returned to normal, and we greatly enjoyed the gatherings and fellowship of the saints.

We visited three Provinces: Southern, Lusaka and Copperbelt, and were warmly welcomed in all the assemblies we visited. We spent most of our time in the city of Livingstone, with the assembly there. We bless God for His preservation of the testimony, despite difficulties and discouragements that they have experienced. In Lusaka we were with the assemblies in Avondale and Great East Road. Avondale was meeting in a rented school classroom, but the assembly has worked hard and have now constructed a Gospel Hall. In Kitwe we had a few nights with the Nkana Assembly, with believers attending from other assemblies in the area.

In every place, it was good to see unsaved under the sound of the Gospel and to see the appreciation of the ministry of the Word of God. We were also touchingly reminded of how things done in the past are remembered and appreciated: one brother opened his Bible and pointed to the inscription at the front, in which he had written that it had been given to him by my late father, on a visit he and my late mother made to Zambia in 1996!

We were so sad to hear of the tragedy in Creeslough (in north Donegal) a few weeks ago, when ten people lost their lives in an explosion, the cause of which is still unclear. We know the area and the shop/petrol station where it occurred. Priscilla's father (the late Gilbert Stewart) and Sam Patterson had meetings in the area many times, and indeed a monthly Gospel meeting has continued to take place in the village for the past 12 years. Paul Kissick and I had a series of drive-in meetings a couple of miles away from there last year, and at the time, the village of Creeslough was covered with tracts and invitations. We pray that the Lord will graciously minister to the need of so many who have been touched by this tragedy, that the hearts of the people will be softened, and that many will be wakened up to the brevity of life and the suddenness of death – and come into the great blessing of salvation.

A week ago, Priscilla and I were over in Scotland for the

conference at Glenburn in Prestwick, where our daughter Esther and her husband Philip were in fellowship for the first three years of their marriage, and it was good to be back with the believers there. This week I am with the assembly in Ebenezer, Bangor, for ministry meetings. Then I hope to be with the Cork assembly for meetings over the coming weekend, Lord willing.

We have been encouraged by having 3 added to the company in Culloden in the last week or two. Julia, whose parents are in fellowship with us had been baptised several years ago, but has now been received into the local church. Also, Tomek and Aga, who were both saved from a Roman Catholic background within the last few years. They have a great desire to serve the Lord and to spread the gospel, so we are really glad they have committed to working with us in fellowship.

We are planning a number of outreaches around Christmas time. Houses of Peace: On the 7th of September, which is a holiday here because it's the 'day of the virgin', patrón saint of Paraná, we had a Mission Day in three different areas simultaneously. Most of the local believers participated. Each 'house of peace' organized something to get nearer to the people around it. Some did door to door work, others invited neighbours to the park to enjoy green tea and an opportunity to spend time playing with the children; others played sports, and some had a women's get together. Please pray for all the people contacted.

Church Life: As in most places, we have encouragements and disappointments. About 80% of our members are involved in some 'house of peace', or with children, teenagers, women, etc but the new believers aren't used to working as a team with other Christians, meaning the older believers have to spend time teaching them how to do things. Family news: Fiona enjoyed three weeks in Scotland in September. The Lord allowed her to be there for two family events: Her aunt's 90th birthday and her brother Gordon's girlfriends funeral. Joy and grief one day after the other. We are expecting the arrival of our second granddaughter any day.

She is a very supportive head at this Catholic Primary and asked the children what they had learned as she had Googled him (William Coltman) already. The boy mentioned how brave he was, and the girl said she had learned about the verse in the Bible that he had learned about - John 3.16, which we repeat a few times in the presentation. When the head asked what it said the girl repeated it and you could tell that she hadn't learnt it before that day - my heart bounced with joy!!

I have just sent off the last documents to be designed today! Our goal is to do a test-run of the curriculum in the coming year before we distribute it country-wide. The BES designer, Tamás, is currently working on several other languages in addition to Chichewa, so quite a few of the revised documents have yet to be designed. Please pray for the Lord to give Tamás daily help as he does this work, and for timely receipt of the designed booklets.

One of the groups we're hoping to use the curriculum with next

year is the children's Bible class that meets here each Saturday. The need for something as systematic, hands-on and gospel centered as the Bibletime curriculum was made evident to me just a few weeks ago. We gave the older students a quiz on what they had been learning, only to find that very few were able to recall previous lessons. More alarming was the fact that only one student was able to answer the question "How can we be saved?" This is after Goodson has faithfully and clearly explained the gospel week after week. While the curriculum itself, as a manmade tool, certainly doesn't automatically result in the salvation of the children, I do think the way it lays a foundation for the gospel and helps children to engage with Scripture through questions and memory verses will be very helpful.

And yet, absolutely nothing will be accomplished without prayer. The minds of the people here have been so blinded by the evil one concerning the way of salvation. There is so much confusion and so many deeply engrained misconceptions. Only the Lord can open their eyes and bring them to a knowledge of the truth. Please pray that we as a team of labourers here would be more prayerful and increasingly dependent upon the Lord to work in salvation and to transform hearts.

We are thankful for the many opportunities to make known the truth of the Gospel in different towns in the region. In São Cristóvão, Salvador, where the assembly meets, the meetings continue as normal. We have been encouraged with the children's meeting there on Thursday evenings. We have an average of 80 young people each week, all of whom live within walking distance of the hall. It would be great to see them saved not only for eternity but also from the vices of crime and violence that are all around them.

The four weekly meetings in Candeias continue to be encouraging. There are a few people there who profess to be saved, some have been baptized and received into fellowship in São Cristóvão and others show a consistent interest. On Friday nights one of the brethren has been bringing some work mates from another town to the meeting, and a few interesting contacts have been made. Please pray for further progress in this town of 90,000 inhabitants.

At the end of April, we had the privilege of commencing another new work in the region. We have rented a hall in the town of São Sebastião do Passé and are being encouraged with a good number of adults and children who pay reverent attention as they hear the Gospel for the first time. It is not difficult to find people to talk to around the doors, but it takes a lot of hard work and patience as we try to break down barriers and face a lot of religious opposition.

As well as the weekly activities, we visit two remote areas each month on Saturdays. Rio dos Paus is about two and a half hours drive from home where we have a lot of contacts. We spend the day going from house to house reading the Scriptures and finding an increasing interest in the Gospel message. Caatinga is another country district about two hours drive from home, where we have a meeting in a school in the afternoon. We usually have about 30 present, mostly children but a few adults as well.

The publishing work continues to keep us busy as time permits. 200,000 copies of a 16-page Gospel booklet have been printed and are being distributed throughout the country. David McKillen's two books are being translated into Portuguese and will be distributed in Brazil and Angola DV. Last Thursday night on the way home from the meeting, we got hit by a stolen car which was being chased by the police. A Venezuelan brother who was with us ended up in intensive care but got home yesterday. We are thankful for the Lord's preservation. The physical part is easy to resolve but the emotional impact is a different story. We would appreciate your prayers as we try to carry on with God's gracious help.

The last few weeks have been rather traumatic, with Judith being rushed into A&E four times within two weeks with rapid and irregular heartbeats. Each time she was given medication to lower her heart rate and was then discharged – and each time, within a few days, the problem returned. She was eventually placed on an urgent list for surgery and having seen a consultant, was due to go into hospital for a cardiac ablation. That, however, had to be cancelled as she went down with a chest infection followed by Covid. The surgery was rescheduled but, when she was admitted, they monitored the heart rate and found it had returned to a natural rhythm! She was promptly discharged – again! Since then, her heart has remained stable, for which we are thankful to the Lord. Looking back, we see God's hand in it and undoubtedly an answer to the prayers of many saints. The Lord is good.

As for myself, I am due to go into hospital this coming Friday for cataract surgery. If all goes well with the surgery on the first eye, they intend to operate on the other in the one operation.

We are grateful for your continued prayers for us and the Lord's work in London.
